
Equality's Call Curriculum Connections

Equality's Call: The Story of Voting Rights in America is a nonfiction picture book about the history of voting rights. The main text of the book is written in rhyme and is relatively short (400 words). An introduction and several pages of backmatter provide additional information and learning opportunities for older students.

Tennessee Social Studies Standards

Equality's Call connects to many Tennessee Social Studies Standards (https://bit.ly/3ufbXY1), including:

- Kinder. K.11 Give examples of the following concepts: authority, fairness, responsibility, and rules.
 - K.16 Explain the purpose of rules and laws.
- **1st gr.** 1.18 Define citizenship, and recognize traits of good citizens, such as respecting the rights of others, voting, following laws, etc.
 - 1.19 Explain that voting is a way of making choices and decisions.
- **2nd gr.** 2.21 Recognize that the U.S. has a constitution, which is the basis for our nation's laws.
 - 2.25 Identify the rights and responsibilities of citizens of the U.S.
 - 2.26 Understand that there are laws written to protect citizens' right to vote.

- 3rd gr. 3.28 Identify representative assemblies and town meetings as early democratic practices during the colonial period.
- **4th gr.** 4.07 Contrast how the principles set forth in the Declaration of Independence clashed with treatment of different groups including: women, slaves, and American Indians.
 - 4.39 Identify the 13th, 14th, and 15th Amendments as efforts to help former slaves begin a new life.
- **5th gr.** 5.09 Analyze the major goals, struggles, and achievements of the Progressive Era, including: Prohibition (18th Amendment), women's suffrage (19th Amendment), and the lack of child labor laws.
 - 5.24 Analyze the key people and events of the Civil Rights Movement.
 - 5.25 Explain the impact of John F. Kennedy's presidency on the country, including: passage of the Civil Rights Act, the Voting Rights Act, the space program, and his assassination.
 - 5.43 Explain the impact of the Tennessee Constitutional Convention of 1870, including: poll taxes, segregation, and funds for public education.
 - 5.45 Identify how the rise of vigilante justice (e.g., Ku Klux Klan), black codes, and Jim Crow laws impacted Tennessee and the nation.
 - 5.47 Identify Tennessee's role in the passage of the 19th Amendment, including the impact of Anne Dallas Dudley and Harry Burn.

Equality's Call is an informational text that uses rhyming stanzas, prose, lists, and illustrations to convey information. It can be used with CCSS Reading Informational Text standards at all grade levels. The content of Equality's Call also offers opportunities for student research, writing, discussion, and presentations. MUSIC The rhyme and rhythm of *Equality's Call* can be used for music and/or performance lessons.

READING BUDDIES Equality's Call is a read-aloud picture book for young students with additional content for older. It can be used for reading buddy programs within a school (e.g. K & 5^{th}) or between schools (e.g. 3^{rd} & HS AP Gov).
